"Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10

It has been a long time waiting it seems since the last gathered body of our global church legislative body, General Conference. The session that is gathered in Charlotte, NC currently is the session that was to have gathered in 2020, predominately dealing with legislation that should have been addressed in that time frame. From conversations with friends who are representing our Michigan Conference and other conferences across the connection, there is a new spirit in the air. The week ahead will be telling as more challenging legislation goes before the larger body.

Worship has been meaningful, memorable and messages have been inspiring. If you are not an early riser worship is at 8am. You can always try to find the

replays online by googling them or searching the umc.org website.

The delegates who represent each conference have full (12 hour days) every day of conference, with Sunday serving as a sabbath. They take time away from their families to prepare for this holy work as they debate legislation that has been prepared pertaining to the future of our denomination. They get to

greet and engage with our siblings in Christ from other continents, they are physical representations of God's Grace in peaceful and prayerful demonstrations for Palestine. They connect with other conferences globally, to discuss pray and colorate the ways God is maying in different nations beyond the US.

There is a spirit of hospitality and love in the air. As I shared in worship on 4/28, the body of the conference is being challenged to share their name, conference, age bracket (youth, young adult, adult, mature adult), gender and race. This helps the body extend hospitality but also for hold the larger body accountable to hearing from all representations of Methodism across the world. In some cases, US delegates have been encouraged to let our siblings from other nations get to the microphone first as legislation began to go before the body in the first week of General Conference.

Each day a legislative book is made available with the proceedings of what happened in legislative groups, that determine what order and priority items come before the floor of the conference. Items either go to the Consent Calendar (a bulk vote of legislation when the legislative committee, a sampling of the larger body who studies, reviews, discusses, amends in some cases, in agreement for or against) or they get added to the calendar to come before the Plenary session. It is sometimes a painful reminder of the Parliamentary Procedures found within Roberts Rules of Order and every conference I'm reminded of the painful nights spent being quizzed on Parli Pro with my FFA Advisor and Parli Pro Teams that competed through high school. If you are interested in taking a closer look at the legislation and any details of general conference, you can go to Google and type in 2020 UMC General Conference on resourceumc.org. If you would like the direct link, reach out to me, I'm happy to share it with you digitally.

Some of the highlights for me so far beyond worship have been—the first Native American Bishop presiding for one of the first legislative sections of the gathered body, I witnessed a historical moment, that took far too long to be lived into. In our first week, the body passed a good portion of the plan for world wide region-

alization, the remainder should be addressed in the second week:

Legislation to provide for Worldwide Regionalization reflects the strong values of equity, respect for contextual mission settings, effective mutuality in mission, and legislative equality for regional bodies of the church. Recognizing the effects of colonization, the guiding principle for the regionalization legislation is to empower each region to make certain context-specific decisions in real-time, without being dependent on General Conference, as well as de-centralizing the influence of the United States on General Conference. 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From the Pastor's Desk

The legislation that impacts the constitution of the UMC will not take effect for at least another 18 months as it will need to be ratified by each Annual Conference in the upcoming years. For example, because our Annual Conference is at the end of the month, we won't likely deal with legislation from General Conference until our 2025 Annual Conference Session. In addition to World Wide Regionalization, there are changes being proposed to our Social Principles. If you aren't familiar with what the Social Principles are—I would encourage you to consider spending some time exploring these. Inside this section of our Book of Discipline resides our stances on many difficult topics we debate in the secular world ranging from eco-justice, marriage & divorce, abortion, war, sexuality, equitable health care, the list goes on and on. It wasn't until I worked for our conference camping program that I fully realized that our church has a stance on so many topics. This section is where we often are identified as a political church. The truth is—the way we were structured makes us political, what this section does for us as United Methodists is encourage us to put our faith into practice in the world as we live our lives. More to come as this final week of General Conference shakes out, I will share other details in next month's newsletter to the best of my ability, along with highlights from Annual Conference. The Michigan Annual Conference

ence gathers at the end of May into the beginning of June.

This month is sure to move quickly, even as program ministries have wound down for the season. I shared at Administrative Board that it is likely you may not catch me much in the office. There is much transition work to do. This might seem different from the transition from Pastor Cathi to me—but some of you can remember that I was involved with Bethany and the Co-operative Parish work, worship planning, in person for meetings, preparing for the transition with coaches and working to transition my former congregation to a new pastor—this time adds up quickly, especially when a pastor has a new appointment to hit the ground running at. If you need to meet or converse over the phone, please reach out to me, just know I'm trying to capitalize on the time that I have between other activities already on my calendar in this last month.

In the upcoming weeks during worship, we will be wrapping up 5 Practices of Fruitful Congregations Series. On Mother's Day, mission banks will be distributed. We will celebrate Pentecost on May 26th and that will be my last Sunday preaching. My final Sunday in worship will be June 2nd to preside for communion (tentatively also save this date for Strawberry Brunch!). Following June 2nd, I'll be "on vacation" finishing packing up the parsonage. The moving truck arrives on June 13th and unloading will begin on June 14th in Grand Ledge. In this time, I appreciate your prayers and I ask that you continue to hold Rev. Sarah Elliott & her family in prayer as they prepare to make a move to Michigan.

announcements/Tower Notes for that!


There is a new front door that has been installed at the Parsonage—It looks really nice! Great job in the selection of the door, Trustees!
